

Moving towards Lent

Friends,

My ponderings in this issue is itemised and I hope it does not appear to be too formal. There are few items informative, few reflective and generally conversational. And, by the time you get to read this, I would have been at the Cathedral only 3 months. This is supposed to have been my honeymoon period and thank you for making it most enjoyable. You would recall my reference to the Dean's quip on the Cathedral being full of 'Chiefs' at the AGM and my response to that as 'now there is an Indian.' I meant it to be a light hearted comment, although some seem to have read it to be literal. May I plead with you that our primary task as the people of God in God's church is to pray and that you will commit to it in every possible way? When we are committed to it with greater discipline, we will see the glory of God shining brightly in our midst.

Try Praying

You may have come across this slogan in various places. There has been poster a campaign promoting prayer in public

places. We who live in a technological western society may find the idea of 'prayer' as the starting point of action, a bit old fashioned. Prayer can be regarded, at times, as procrastination. Prayer can be a substitute for commitment and action. Prayer can be purely a ritual with no relevance to reality. Whichever way you regard prayer, it is our primary and ultimate duty and joy. And everything else we do is only secondary to it. Firstly, we pray in obedience to Christ's command and encouraged by his saints and martyrs. Secondly, we pray with the One who alone offers prayers in truth and worthy of offering them i.e. our Lord Jesus Christ. Thirdly, we offer prayers in His name, through him and with him. It is therefore absolutely necessary that the prayers we offer are in line with the life and teachings of our Lord and his saints. In the Episcopal Church we are blessed with forms of prayers in the Prayer Book, a crystallised form of the Holy Bible, with Matins, Evensong and Eucharistic Liturgies. A regular and disciplined

use of these forms of prayers help us to pray extemporaneously and silently. As we enter the season of Lent, please be encouraged to be disciplined in prayer, daily and weekly. May I prayerfully ask you to break away from annual, monthly and fortnightly patterns to weekly and daily prayers?

Lent 2016

We will be entering the holy season of Lent this week with the rituals of Pancake and Mulled Wine Party at the John Skinner Centre on Shrove Tuesday from 7 to 10pm, Imposition of Ashes at 10am Holy Communion and 6.30pm Sung Eucharist on Ash Wednesday. And on Fridays throughout Lent I have put together a Lenten Study Series commencing from the 12th of February and ending on the 11th of March. The idea is to gather for Communion as the Church from various denominations, share in a simple breakfast, stay on for a short talk followed by discussion and end with Compline, the Night

Prayer. The whole evening is limited to 2 hours i.e. from 6 to 8pm. It is open to all. You will find the details in the pages of this FOCUS (at the back).

Festival of Light 2016

The Festival of Light was held for a fortnight from Sunday the 24th of January to the 6th of February 2016. This is a sequel to an Interfaith event held at Patrick Cheyne Centre in the summer of 2015 when representatives from the three monotheistic faiths came together to reflect on God as Light. The fortnight of events included music presentations, art exhibition, talks and a pilgrimage to the Orkney Islands. This is also a part of the Scientists in Congregations project initiated by our former Provost Richard Kilgour and his co-director Prof Nicolae Bulz and funded by the Templeton Foundation. The Cover Page

On Sunday the 24th of January over 200 people gathered in our Cathedral for a world music event in Solidarity with all those are or feel marginalised and alienated by the society and its politics. This was inspired by a group of young people from Aberdeen who believe that the world could be a better place if we see things for what they really are and celebrate one another's differences as God given. When differences are used as political weapons to judge and alienate, we bring misery and our recent history had proved this in two world wars which we remember with great pomp and piety. Is there a way forward? A lot of people, both young and old believe that there are many ways forward and one of them is the good combination of art and music which we are richly blessed with at St Andrew's Cathedral.

On the day of the world music 'Solidarity Sunday' event on the

24th of January one of nearly a 100 young people from the University walked into the Cathedral. He sat in a pew and a few minutes later I saw him pull out a notepad and start drawing. Initially it looked as if he was scribbling something on the notepad out of boredom. A few minutes later the image on the cover page appeared. All who saw him do this were amazed and wondered if he were an art student. He denied he was an art student and said that it would never usually do this. The only word that came to my mind was, 'Inspiration'!

The Cathedral Church of St Andrew, Aberdeen is a place of 'Inspiration' I believe. John Betjeman was right about the 'leaping heart' when you enter the Cathedral. This was made possible through the faithful few who endured persecution for their faith in God whose worship should have beauty and splendour in words and the space used for it. Yet now take courage, O Zerubbabel, says the Lord; take courage, O Joshua, son of Jehozadak, the high priest; take courage, all you people of the land, says the Lord; **work, for I am with you**, says the Lord of hosts, according to the promise that I made you when you came out of Egypt. My spirit abides among you; **do not fear**. For thus says the Lord of hosts: Once again, in a little while, **I will shake the heavens and the earth and the sea and the dry land**; and I will shake all the nations, so that the treasure of all nations shall come, and **I will fill this house with splendour**, says the Lord of hosts. The silver is mine, and the gold is mine, says the Lord of hosts. **The latter splendour of this house shall be greater than the former**, says the Lord of hosts; and in this place I will give prosperity, says the Lord of hosts." A Plea About Gift-Aid

I am currently finalising the cathedral gift-aid claim for the 2012/13 tax year. I estimate that we will only be able to reclaim tax on approximately two-thirds of the money donated over that period in free will offering envelopes (the green weekly envelopes) and via standing orders.

I realise not everyone pays tax, but even taking that into account, I believe there are many regular donors who pay tax but have not signed a gift-aid declaration, particularly amongst those who have joined the congregation within the last five years.

If you are such a person, or are in any doubt, please could you e-mail the office to request a declaration form.

We can e-mail it to you to print off, fill in, sign and return. You can either hand it to one of the stewards before or after a service, give it to myself, or you can leave it in an envelope addressed to the cathedral office on the table beside the hatch in the JSC.

Car Parking Update

We still haven't got a barrier at the entrance to the JSC car park. The supplier did arrive with the barrier and fitted it in January. However, he immediately decided that it was unstable in the vertical position and could potentially blow

down (into the closed position) in strong winds. He has, therefore, taken it back to the workshop to lower its centre of gravity in the upright position.

Meanwhile, I have now issued

priority cathedral parking permits to all the blue badge holders I am aware of. If there is anyone with a blue badge who brings their car to the cathedral regularly and does not have a cathedral permit, please contact me. We believe the barrier will soon be installed. It will then be kept locked and keys will be available so that people on legitimate cathedral

business can open it and get in to park. This will render further permits redundant, therefore I have changed my plan, in consultation with the Provost, and I will not issue any permits for members of the congregation who are not blue badge holders. The blue badge cathedral permits will continue to be useful to show that these cars have priority parking at all times.

Informal Summary of the Trustees Meetings in December 2015 and January 2016

The Trustees met three times during December and January, although one of the meetings was not quorate as only five members were present. The meetings focussed on the Cathedral Development Project.

1) Review of the 2011-13 Plans for the Cathedral Development Project

Professor Sleeman presented a review of the 2011-13 Project to the Trustees. He highlighted the importance of appointing three key people to the Project:

- A Fund Raising Coordinator
- A Clerk of Works (Project manager)
- A Financial Controller.

He also emphasised the importance of reaching out to help others who are outside the existing Cathedral community. The Provost suggested that we focus our charitable works on local causes, such as the homeless who frequent the cathedral precincts, the Bethany Trust (with which we already have links)

and those who feel vulnerable or threatened because of their faith (building on Solidarity Sunday).

Those members of the Trustees who were on the Board during the 2011-13 period informed the Provost and newly elected members of three particular, recurring concerns voiced by the congregation:

- Whether to move the font nearer the West Door
- Whether to move the Lady Chapel west
- Whether to re-locate the cross currently suspended over the crossing to the steps at the entrance to the Suther Chapel (i.e. over the Rood Screen).

2) Congregational Consultation on Development Project

The Trustees agreed that further congregational input was required and that this should take place throughout the month of January, providing the Provost with feedback before his visit to the USA in February. Plans illustrating the

three different worship modes would be displayed for several weeks in the Suther Chapel and the consultation would conclude with an EGM immediately after the Eucharist on 31st of January 2016.

3) Streamlining the working of the Trustees

The Trustees agreed that it would be beneficial to improve the efficiency of decision making, in line with the suggestions of Anne Harper (a Diocesan Trustee of the Cathedral) and as recommended by the Diocese and Province. This matter was also scheduled for the EGM on 31st January.

4) Advisory Boards for the Development Project

The Provost described his plans to set up two Advisory Boards, primarily as vehicles for networking, enabling us to tap into funding sources. One Board will be based in Aberdeen, chaired by the Bishop. The Provost has begun to recruit high profile, well

connected members of the Aberdeen community to this group.

The second Advisory Board will be based in the USA. It will comprise Rev. William Lupfer (the Rector of Trinity), Rev. Kristin Miles (also on the Trinity staff), Rev. Professor Gordon Graham and the Rev. Michael Belt of St. James's, New London, CT. Gordon Graham suggests that we register a charity account in the USA, which will then automatically be credited with tax rebates when donations are received from USA tax payers. William Lupfer has agreed to host this account at Trinity, Wall Street. Money would be transferred from it to our UK account at our request. The Provost intends to meet some of this group in New York before his visit to Connecticut on 18th February, to finalise the arrangements.

5) Appointment of Person with Responsibility for Grant Applications

The Trustees agreed to

appoint an individual specifically to generate and submit applications to the following funding bodies:

- Listed Places of Worship: Roof Repair Fund. Funds up to £100,000, specifically for roof repairs, with an application deadline of Friday 26th February 2016.
- Grants for Places of Worship (Scotland). Funding up to £250,000 with a deadline for submission of applications of 4th March 2016.

6) Grants from the Dr John Anderson Trust

The Bishop is on the board of this Trust. He has informed the Provost that the John Anderson Trustees would like to award the Cathedral a 5-year grant, to a value of £15,000 per year. The Bishop encouraged the Cathedral to apply and suggested that a proposal to spend the money on capital project(s) related to the music of the cathedral could be received favourably.

Minutes of Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) 31 January 2016

Two Resolutions were presented to the meeting by the Chairman (the Provost):

Resolution 1:

- a. That this EGM invites the Trustees to review the current Constitution of the Cathedral Church St Andrew, Aberdeen and submit a Revised Constitution based on the Provincial model (2008) at the end of 3 months from this meeting for the first reading.
- b. And grant the Trustees' request to amend the quorum from six to three in accordance with the Provincial model with immediate effect until it is ratified through the AGM of 2016.

Discussion & Decisions:

- The chairman proposed amending the wording of Resolution 1a from "Cathedral Church St

Andrew” to “Cathedral Church of St Andrew”. The meeting accepted this amendment.

- Resolution 1b: The Chairman explained the reason for the proposed amendment, so that important business would not be held up by a lack of a necessary quorum – it being more difficult to achieve a quorum given the number of diocesan representatives (3) now on the board. After some discussion it was agreed that the quorum should be set at 3 with the provision that 2 out of the 3 should be members of the Trustees elected by the Cathedral congregation.

Resolution 2:

That this EGM commits itself, in prayer,

- a. To the Cathedral Development Programme (to be launched in Autumn 2016)
- b. To consideration of the three options presented in

the plans, and

c. To develop the Nave and the crossing for Cathedral Multifunction as directed by the Trustees in continual consultation with Core Operational Teams, the Project Manager and the Architect

Discussion & Decisions:

- There was no discussion on point A.
- Discussion of point B:
 - ⇒ The chairman reminded the meeting that 3 plans prepared by the architect earlier were being considered (namely ones labelled Worship modes A, B & C); these plans had been displayed in the South Aisle for a few weeks. We were assured that each option entailed ensuring that the roof and the structure of the building was sound, refurbishment / redevelopment of the electrics, heating, audio system, and a redecorating of the building.
 - ⇒ Various points were made about these options –

including some suggestions which would result in further variants. The views of the meeting were solicited, and the meeting supported option A (i.e. leaving the Lady Chapel and Font in their current locations).

⇒ Following this decision there was a brief discussion about whether this phase of the work would include the "Old School", the Provost said that it is unlikely at this stage. However, in response to many request to hold Daily Prayers at the Cathedral, both at his Installation and since, and to make the Cathedral more accessible, Isaac said that it seemed prudent to convert part of the Cathedral properties now used by the Peacock Visual Arts for residential use.

- Discussion of point C:

⇒ The chairman explained that developing the Nave and Crossing for

'Cathedral Multifunction' included raising the floor in the Crossing area by 2 steps, to improve visibility from all parts of the Nave.

⇒ The chairman explained what he meant by "Core Operational Teams" – namely the groups in the Cathedral who use the central space regularly: eg the Choir, servers, flower team, junior church etc.

⇒ Several people raised the issue of access for disabled people if the area was raised as part of the planned development of the Nave & Crossing, and the meeting was assured by the Provost that the Project Manager & Architect would address these concerns. Given this reassurance this aspect of the plan was also accepted by the meeting.


